Baby Shots

Your baby needs the following shots at the four month visit:

- DTaP
- Polio
- HIB
- Hepatitis B
- Pneumococcal
- Rotavirus

Making sure your baby receives shots protects her from getting diseases that can cause serious illness. Ask your doctor or health department for more information on these shots.

Call your doctor or the health department (1-800-432-4121 or 547-0295) to make an appointment for your baby's four month shots.

Your baby is starting to tell people apart, so introduce her to new people gradually. She is fascinated by his or her hands now. Babies at 4 months old are interested in the people and the things around them, and enjoy hugs, kisses, songs, and smiles from family members. Celebrate this time with your baby by cuddling, rocking, and singing.

Your Baby at 4 Months...

Your baby can:

- Hold head up when on tummy and roll from stomach or side to back
- Reach for objects and play with hands
- Coo, grin and squeal
May like to play peek-a-boo
- Enjoy looking at and being near special people

Your baby needs:

- ...time on tummy on flat surface with favorite toys around but slightly out of reach to encourage movement when awake
- ...bright objects placed within reach
- ...someone to smile, laugh and talk back to her
- ...loving play from parents and family
- ...parents to spend time on The floor with him/her



Safety Needs:

- remove crib toys that fit across the crib
- hold baby when feeding bottle to help prevent ear infections
- safe place for parents to put your baby if care becomes stressful; shaking can harm your baby

Dental Needs:

- wipe your baby's teeth and gums with a damp washcloth to remove plaque
- begin brushing as soon as you see your baby's first tooth!
- parents with tooth decay need treatment
- keep your baby's teeth healthy by not giving her a bottle in bed

The Road to Reading...

4 months

*Talk * Read *Explore

You can:

- * **Read** with your baby in your lap. Be brief, but read often. Reading lets your baby hear your voice and the sounds the words make.
- * **Listen** when your baby “talks.” This will encourage your baby to keep “talking” with sounds and gestures.
- * **Say** rhymes when you play with your baby. Repeating rhymes helps your baby learn sounds that will help with reading later on.

Book Corner: Continue using books with simple, large pictures of people or familiar objects. Stiff cardboard books or “chunky” books are also fun. Soft vinyl books can go in the bath with your baby or get washed.

Babies all develop at different rates. There are many resources to help you as a parent of a 4 month-old:

Books with parenting information are available at your local library.

Great Start provides parents with information, resources, and activities to support the healthy growth of young children. This newsletter, playgroups, a home visit from a registered nurse, child development guides, and family events at local schools are some of the opportunities available. You need to register to take advantage of these free services.

The **Great Start Network** offers an **event line** for families to keep you up to date on the events happening in your school district for families with children 0-5. Call **1-877-866-3714** twenty four hours a day and receive access to the event line.

Need health insurance for your children ages 0-19 years? **Healthy Kids Medicaid** or **MICChild** is available. Call 547-0295 or 1-800-432-4121 for more information.

WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) provides formula, juice and cereal for babies! Milk, eggs, cheese, cereal, juice and peanut butter are also available for children 1-5 years, pregnant, and postpartum women. A family of four who earns less than \$3,554 per month may qualify. Call **1-800-432-4121** for more information.
